I stress the lack of Equivalence.

1. The continued use of existing <u>in-house copper wiring is essential</u> – <u>yet not guaranteed</u>.

The <u>number of telephone sockets</u> and thereby ability to ring from almost everywhere in the house and basement are important as <u>mobility recedes (or is accidentally compromised).</u>

Old-fashioned telephones are easy to grab and hold, and have large <u>print</u> for numbers – important when eyesight etc.diminuishes. The long term safety of radiation exposure from WIFI has not been

proven.
