



# Section 201 – Geographically consistent pricing

### **Background**

- The Commerce Commission (Commission) is formulating price-quality (PQ) paths and information disclosure (ID) requirements to implement its input methodologies (IMs) for regulated fibre fixed line access services (FFLAS) under Part 6 of the Telecommunications Act 2001 (the Act).
- 2. The Commission does not set the prices for individual services provided by regulated FFLAS providers (**regulated providers**). Rather, the Commission formulates PQ paths and ID requirements that regulated providers must comply with in providing and charging for FFLAS.
- 3. Section 201 of the Act, however, requires Chorus to set prices that are geographically consistent. It provides:

#### 201 Geographically consistent pricing

A regulated fibre service provider who is subject to price-quality regulation must, regardless of the geographic location of the access seeker or end-user, charge the same price for providing fibre fixed line access services that are, in all material respects, the same.

- 4. In our Proposed Process and Approach paper, we signalled that we would consult on the specific way that the geographically consistent pricing requirement in s 201 will apply to regulated providers subject to PQ regulation.<sup>1</sup>
- 5. Today, we have published our draft guidance on s 201 geographically consistent pricing (**draft guidance**). We now seek stakeholders' views on the draft guidance.

- 9. The protection of confidential information is something we take seriously. We have developed a submission process to continue to protect confidential submissions. When you upload your submission via the form from the project page, you will be required to provide (if necessary) both a confidential and non-confidential version of your submission and to clearly identify the confidential and non-confidential versions.
- 10. When including commercially sensitive or confidential information in your submission, we offer the following guidance:
  - 10.1 Provide a clearly labelled confidential version and public version. We intend to publish all public versions on our website.
  - 10.2 The responsibility for ensuring that confidential information is not included in a public version of a submission rests entirely with the party making the submission.
- 11. If we consider information disclosed in the confidential version to be in the public interest, we will consult with the party that provided the information before any such disclosure is made.
- 12. We will provide the opportunity for interested parties to provide views on the submissions on the draft guidance by inviting cross-submissions. You will then have until **5pm** on **8 July 2021** to make a cross-submission.
